### Task Force on Adult Religious Education (ARE)

Topic: Resourcing Adult Religious Education At the 2000 APRRE meeting we assembled approximately 35 people to talk about Stories of Adult Education. The interest in the topic was considerable and we would like to continue chairing the task force this year but with a slightly different focus. Last year there was great energy around resources; many of the participants came to get ideas for teaching and to find out more about adult religious education publishing and research. Our focus for 2001 is resources. We will:

1. Use the email list created for the ARE group, by Jane Regan (Boston College), to personally invite ARE participants back to the group.

- 2. We plan to use the time to have 6 invited presenters do demonstrations or explanations of readings, organizations, journals, teaching methods, web pages, ideas, syllabi, or challenges, in ARE. We will have each person present for 10 minutes each (on the what, how, and why of the resource) and we will ask them to bring handouts for the participants.
- 3. We will leave time for exchange of ideas and announcements.

We hope this proposal meets with your approval.

I will tidy up the books for the 2000-2001 fiscal year and prepare the federal tax return, and then my formal responsibilities are concluded. I will remain available as needed during the months ahead. and will help with some of the preparation (if and as needed) for the Fall 2001 Annual Meeting in Minneapolis.

I offer my heartfelt gratitude to all those members, especially officers, and most especially the Vice-Presidents who plan programs, who have worked so hard in support of the Association over the last six years. I also gratefully remember the gracious assistance offered me by Padraic O'Hare as I moved into this position in 1994.

What do I plan to do with all my APRREfree time? I will get back to the writing that has been postponed, especially the book on truth and self-deception in education and ministry; Anabel has already claimed some more of my time for teaching at Lancaster Theological Seminary and I am spending more time playing golf, training a new puppy and reading novels, historical fiction, poetry and mysteries.

In fact, let me recommend a few of my recent favorites: Ian Pears, An Instance of the Fingerpost (a postmodern mystery set in 17<sup>th</sup> century England, with a theological resolution!); Adriana Trigiani's Big Stone Gap, a wonderful character study; Arthur Golden's fascinating account of the Memoirs of a Geisha - a remarkable world revealed; Tracy Chevalier's Girl with a Pearl Earring - a charming fictional account of one of the painter Vermeer's subjects; and David Nevin's Eagle's Cry - a fascinating historical reconstruction of the republic from 1799-1803 (it seems the political contests haven't changed much!); and Barbara Kingsolver's Prodigal Summer -one of those books which provide not only a good lesson in ecology and in life, but which you don't want to end because you have fallen in love with her characters. Or you might try Peter Tremayne's mystery series about Sister Fidelma, a seventh century Celtic nun who actually was also a justice in the legal system depicting a version of society and Christianity in Ireland more attractive than the European version which later replaced it. Enough!

All that aside, I want to tell you all how full and rich you have helped make my life since I attended my first APRRE meeting in 1966. And these last six years, I have enjoyed being able to give something back, as well as stay in touch with you all. While it has occasionally been trying, it has also been very satisfying. I feel blessed. Thanks to you all!

I look forward to seeing you all in Minneapolis this fall!

### Membership and Budget Report

The near-end of June comparison for the last three years is as follows:

The current membership consists of:

The 2000-2001 Budget adopted called for income of \$34,650 and expenses of \$34,640. While the fiscal year is not quite complete, it looks like the income will be about \$37,650 and expenses will be near \$34,000. Both membership renewals and interest income exceeded expectations, and the 2000 Annual Meeting finished with a net gain to the Association. We currently have reserves (in interest bearing CD's, including \$12,500 in Travel Funds) of about \$19,300 and a current checking account balance of about \$5600 as of this writing.

This healthy reserve total, the best in years, has been enhanced by the generosity of members in giving to the Travel Fund appeal in recent years. That continues to need members' support, for the sake of our younger members and student members.

As was noted in the previous report, the Travel Fund continues to grow - perhaps making possible increased disbursements in the near future. It is important to continue to support our student members in this manner.
